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


Happy Birthday, Shel!

Q: How did you meet Rick Karp?



In the Garden with Rick September Garden Tasks

September in San Francisco is the time to think about permanent landscaping—trees and shrubs do especially well when planted in our warm autumn soils, allowing them to take in the winter rains. And after our foggy summer, fall is a great time to be outdoors working in your garden.


✓ To plant a tree, simply make a hole in the ground at least the size of the container; then gently remove the tree from its container and place in the hole. It is important to not plant the tree too low in the ground. This leads to soil mounding up around the trunk, which can lead to rot disease, which in turn can kill the tree. Water well.

✓ Prune and clean evergreen bushes.

✓ Plant a winter vegetable garden. Sow seeds of beets, carrots, lettuces, mesclun mix, radishes, snow peas and spinach. Set out seedlings of artichoke, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, kale and strawberry.



✓ Make room and plan your spring bulb garden. Calculate the number of bulbs required for the area. Store them in a cool, dark place until planting time—the end of September or early October. Bulbs need cool soil to be planted. Remember that crocus, hyacinths and tulips require six to eight weeks of “pre-cooling” to bloom well. Store bulbs in labeled paper bags in the refrigerator separated from all food, particularly fruit.



✓ Keep all trees, especially citrus, well watered. Those planted in containers need watering almost daily. Citrus plants will get their last feeding this month. We have an organic all-purpose fertilizer by E. B. Stone. (Sku 745032, \$7.99)



✓ Deadhead perennials and divide those that look crowded. Lift and loosen clumps and divide into sections, removing any dead parts. Amend the soil with compost and replant any bare spots. Water well.

✓ If you started your tomatoes late and are worried about their ripening in time, try



pinching off all of the flower clusters; this allows for all of the plant’s resources to go into ripening the remaining fruit. Withhold water to give a more delicious taste. This stresses the plant, which can increase chance of disease; however, since the season is almost over, it is okay.

✓ Collect mature seed heads and keep them in a warm place to dry out. Once dry, store them in labeled envelopes in a cool, dry place.



✓ This can be one of our hotter, dryer months, so be sure to water container plants often.

✓ Fertilizers, including those that are nontoxic, should never be applied during the heat of the day.

✓ To keep pests away from your garden, harvest fruits daily.





September Canning

According to the *Ball Blue Book Guide to Preserving*, foods among the easiest to preserve are those with naturally high levels of acid. Mold, yeast and enzymes, the largest concern when preserving foods, are destroyed at a temperature of 212°F, which is easily reached when using the boiling-water method.

Fruits in season this time of the year that are ideal for preserving include grapes, tomatoes, pears, peaches, nectarines and apples. They



should be harvested or purchased only at their peak of flavor, texture and color. Fruit can be preserved whole, sliced, as a sauce or juiced to provide versatility in serving and

It's September, and that means it is National Preparedness Month . . . again! If you've been waiting for the right moment to assemble or revisit your household, car, or workplace emergency kit, that time is now.

Storm Windows Help With Your Pane

Mornings can get cold here. I am surprised I feel this way because I am from upstate New York and the winter mornings there can take your breath away. During the oil embargo in 1973, for example, I remember waking up in the morning with ice crystals on the inside of my bedroom windows! I'll bet some of you notice how chilly it can get here when you roll out of bed in the morning in a house with doors and windows that no longer keep all of the cold at bay. Although we might have our nicest weather in the Bay Area in September, this is also a good time to start preparing your home for winter.

In addition to seeing your gas and electric bill lowered, by fixing these drafty doors and windows you are making our neighborhoods a bit greener. When we lower the amount of energy that we use in our homes, we also lower the amount of air pollution that is produced by our power plants.

One solution to this problem is to have storm windows installed in your home, which is something you may want to consider as you make your list of home improvements for this coming spring. Storm windows are mounted either outside or inside an ordinary window to improve energy efficiency. They are often recommended on the exterior for those who would like to protect the original doors and windows from the elements.

Storm windows can be added to a home at a relatively low cost and without much construction. They can be installed without changing the trim or the interior of the window, so they are viable from a preservation standpoint. You get not only the increased energy efficiency but also retain the complete look of your home. In other words, you can protect the historical material of your home, the ultimate in sustainability. Another benefit is that you will see improvements in sound insulation.

There may also be the added benefit for making such home improvements in the form of tax credits. So in this case, it actually pays to be green! I know what some of you are thinking. "Bill, isn't the only way to really solve this problem to just replace all of the drafty doors and windows in my home with new ones?" The answer to that question may surprise you.

My friend Joe, who worked at the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, wanted to see if this was the case, and he came to us some years back to ask us to make some windows for a study. He wanted to compare the performance of old, leaky windows that had storm windows



added against the performance of new replacement windows. His study actually found that the addition of Low-E storm windows to the prime window provided performance very similar to that of the replacement window and that there was a minimal added energy savings by doing the full replacement. So, upgrading a drafty window with a double-glazed, Low-E

storm window will give you almost as much added energy efficiency as would a complete replacement and at a much lower cost.

So now that we are heading into our fall and winter months, think of whether storm windows make sense for you and the needs of your home. You can send your pictures of your leaky windows to see if I can answer any questions. And don't forget that little green actions like this can make a big difference for us all.




The Lost Art of Laundry

These days, our wash-and-wear lifestyles dictate our wash-and-wear laundry habits. Long gone are “washdays,” when our grandmothers devoted one day a week to laundering the clothes, hanging them out in the fresh air to dry and then ironing the wrinkles out of everything. These days, with Mom more likely to be found in a boardroom than a laundry room, and time being a valuable commodity, clotheslines are closely following pay phones on the road to extinction.

Fire your dryer! Although a big-city lifestyle doesn't exactly lend itself to dryerless living, there are alternatives available to hitting the fluff-dry button, allowing for energy and money savings and a lower carbon footprint—plus, your clothes will last longer! If the owners of all 90 million American household clothes dryers line dried their laundry for just six months a year, the total residential output of carbon dioxide in the United States would be reduced by over 3%.

Accordion dryers: Polder® accordion dryers fold flat for storage, provide ample drying space and are steel-constructed with nonskid plastic feet.

Drying space ranges from 14 to 29 linear feet. (Skus 6161798, 6761100, 6161863, \$20.99–\$34.99)



Pulley clotheslines: These may be hung building-to-building or building-to-pole and are an inexpensive alternative to electric dryers.



These can be strung indoors or outdoors. Old-fashioned wooden clothespins hold up to 10 pounds each and come in a 96-count package. (Sku 62685, \$6.99)

Octopus arm dryer: Ideal for small indoor spaces, but perfect for outdoor use too, this swing-out dryer attaches to a wall to offer 60 linear feet of drying space. Then it simply folds down when not in use. (Sku 676036, \$49.99)



About your unmentionables: Retractable clotheslines can be easily strung in your bathroom to hold lighter loads and extend up to 8 feet. Polished metallic housing for indoor or outdoor use.



(Sku 65218, \$14.99) PVC-coated wire clothespins have a smooth finish that won't snag delicate fabrics. Package of 12. (Sku 6067110, \$3.79)

- 3 tablespoons vodka
- 10–20 drops scented essential oil
- 2 cups distilled water
- Mason jar or other tight-sealing jar

Mix the vodka and oil together; then add the distilled water. Seal the jar tightly and shake well.

Place in a dark spot for two weeks. Pour ironing water into a spray bottle to use. Always test on a hidden seam or on a pillowcase. Leftover water can be stored in the refrigerator for future use.

Why House Paint Fails

The month of September in the Bay Area provides an ideal time for exterior house painting, with what is usually our best weather of the year. Many factors can affect whether a painting project succeeds or fails. According to David Underwood of Benjamin Moore, weather, moisture and wood quality must be considered before any painting project. Take into account these common problems and remedies from Underwood before working on your home's curb appeal.

Problem: The wood is wet.

Remedy: If only the surface of the wood is wet, one sunny day is needed to dry it out before painting. If the wood is saturated, several sunny/windy days are needed before painting. Ideally, the humidity level should be between 12% and 14%.

Problem: The weather is cold or expected to get cold.

Remedy: Primers as well as oil-based paints and stains should be applied when the surface temperature is at least 50°F. Some non-oil-based paints may be applied to surface temperatures as low as 40°F. In addition, conditions should remain at or above these temperatures for 24 hours.

Problem: The weather is hot or is expected to get hot.

Remedy: If the temperature is above 90°F, do not paint! Underwood suggests following the sunlight around the house: Paint the east side in late morning, the south side in midafternoon, the west side in late afternoon. The north side may be painted any time during the day; however, allow for at least two hours for the fresh paint to dry before the weather conditions cool to the point where dew forms. If blisters do occur, allow the paint to dry for a few days; then scrape off the blisters, smooth the edges by sanding and repaint the areas.

Problem: It's very humid.

Remedy: When water-based paints cure, the water should evaporate as fast as or faster than the solvents. After the water evaporates,



the paint will shrink to nearly its final shape, and as the solvents evaporate, the paint chemically reacts to form a hard material. But when the weather is too humid, water cannot evaporate, and the solvents end up evaporating first. Paint then cures in a water-

filled state and cannot recover from this type of failure. Oil-based paints will also fail if conditions are too humid. A relative humidity of 50% is ideal.

Problem: The wood siding is dirty.

Remedy: If the wood is dirty, power wash it or clean it with a detergent and bristle or brass brush before applying paint. Never use a steel or iron brush, which causes iron stains and may glaze the surface.

Problem: The wood

has decayed or rotted.

Remedy: Decayed wood is a result of wood that has been wet for an extended period. If the wood is soft and spongy, it is degraded to the point that it will never hold paint and should be replaced.

Ideal Outdoor Painting Conditions

Temperature:

Between 50°F and 90°F, with 50% relative humidity.

Evening Temperature:

Don't forget to check the expected low temperature for the night, as your latex finish coat should not go below freezing the first night after application.

Moisture Levels:

Humidity is always a factor when painting exteriors, with 50% humidity ideal.
