Q: What types of safety products are available for roofers and painters working at dangerous heights?

A: According to OSHA, any time a worker is at a height of 4 feet or more, the worker is at risk and needs to be protected. Fall protection must be provided at 4 feet in general industry, 5 feet in maritime and 6 feet in construction.

Fall protection systems are designed to arrest a free fall or restrain a worker to prevent a fall. Any roofer, painter or construction workers working above these heights should

use some form of an OSHA-approved restraint. Employers can be cited for noncompliance and face fines ranging from \$7,000 to \$70,000 per violation.

Cole Fox Hardware offers a professional five-point universal harness from 3M that adjusts to fit sizes small to extra large. Featuring an adjustable chest strap, quick connect buckles,



In the Garden with Rick August Garden Tasks

While August is the last official month of summer, we're fortunate in San Francisco to enjoy summerlike weather well into the fall months. By this time, you should be savoring all the hard work you put into your garden in the spring and earlier summer. Regardless of whether we have an unpredictable heat wave or our predictable marine layer of fog, smart watering of your garden and plants is still essential.

✓ Hanging Baskets and Container Plants: During heat waves, these plants should be checked on a daily basis. On moderate summer days, check every other day. Don't check only the surface: poke your finger about an inch or two down to assure adequate moisture. Thoroughly water each time you water, while being careful not to overwater.

✓ Watering: Proper watering is the key to conserving water in the heat of summer. Watering an inch per week at one time will soak the soil 6 to 8 inches deep and ensure good yield from mature crops.

 Mulch: If your mulch has decomposed, add more as necessary. Two inches of mulch will cool the soil and reduce surface evaporation of water. (



surface evaporation of water. (Sku 75958, 2 cu. ft., \$6.99)

 Blooming Shrubs and Trees: After summerblooming plants have finished flowering, prune for shape, while removing dead or diseased branches.

✓ Plant a Fall Vegetable Garden: Early August is a great time to plant fall and winter vegetables directly into the garden. Spinach, carrots, beets, lettuce, radishes and green onions are ideal to plant now.

 Spring Bulbs: Now is the time to buy your spring bulbs for both planting and forcing.



Pests: Unwanted garden guests can be problematic at this time. Diatomaceous earth can control many insects, including ants, slugs, silverfish, earwigs, fleas, spiders, bedbugs and millipedes. A naturally occurring soft sedimentary rock, diatomaceous earth can be crumbled easily into a fine white powder and is safe on both outdoor and indoor plants. (Sku 7115835, 4 lb. bag, \$11.99)

✓ Hydrangea Pruning: Older stems finished flowering should be trimmed, while

leaving stems that have not yet blossomed. For bigger flower clusters, cut down on the number of stems. Keep more stems for medium-sized flowers, neatly spaced.

✓ Fruit Trees: Give your trees a good soaking, as they especially need water now to ensure they don't drop their fruit. Heavily laden branches should be propped to avoid breakage. Herbs: Harvest herbs for cooking and drying now. Herbs will grow longer if harvested regularly.

Why Buy Local Foods?

We're fortunate in the Bay Area to have an abundance of foods grown and raised within a small radius of where we live and ample opportunities to incorporate these food choices into our lifestyles. The local food movement even has a word for someone who prefers to buy foods and services from local businesses: *locavore*. Here are just some of the reasons to plan your next dinner with the fabulous food fare found nearby.

• **Better Taste.** The average distance produce is flown or trucked in is 1,500 miles! Produce grown locally was most likely picked in the

last 24 hours, preserving its flavor. A weeklong produce shipment allows for sugars to turn to starches, plant cells to shrink and vitality to be lost.

• Better Nutritional Value. Fresh produce loses nutrients quickly, and often food frozen or canned right

after harvest is actually better than produce that might have been on a supermarket shelf or truck for an extended period of time. Food purchased close to its harvest has a better chance of retaining nutrients.

• Community Support. Studies show





Unlike incandescent lights, LEDs are built inside solid protective cases, making them extremely durable. LED lights are

becoming more commonplace in everyday applications and are used in traffic and signal lights, as status indicators on electronic equipment, in exit signs, and in emergency vehicle lights. In addition, holiday light strands





are now made of LEDs, and they can also be found more and more in home décor. Light up that stair well or workstation,

PRODUCT KNOWLEDGE

Glass Food Storage

With many of us cooking at home to save money these days and the controversy surrounding plastics containing bisphenol A (BPA), food storage is more of a concern. Although plastic is convenient, inexpensive and lightweight to carry for lunches, glass containers with tight fitting lids are the best choice for safe food storage.

When plastic comes in contact with food, molecules of the plastic, including BPA, can leach into the food. High-acid and liquidlike foods, such as tomato sauce, are more likely to interact with plastic. Microwaving foods can make plastic transference more likely also.

excellent for both storing foods in the refrigerator and freezer and reheating leftovers in the microwave or oven. (Frozen foods should be thawed before



cooking or reheating in the oven.) Available in both round and rectangular shapes in an array of sizes from 1 cup to 7 cups, these containers stack easily. (Skus 637000, 3-7, \$5.99-\$16.99)

For storing dry foods such as flour, pasta, rice and beans, use glass canisters such as the Firenze® hermetic jars. These jars provide an airtight seal to preserve contents, and the clean lines make the jars attractive enough



to be displayed on a kitchen counter. (Skus 628189, 235, \$5.99-\$6.99) Glass pitchers for storing homemade drinks, such as lemonade or iced



tea, are also available and are great to use to keep the plastic taste and smell out of your liquids. As we make more informed choices about what we eat, home canning allows us to also keep additives and preservatives out of our families' diets. And if you don't have a garden, the farmers' markets so abundant in the Bay Area are full of freshly picked and locally grown fruits and vegetables.




Home canning is not complicated. It is a simple procedure that

applies heat to food in a closed glass jar to interrupt the natural decaying that would take place otherwise. There are two types of canning methods: water bath (boiling water) canning and pressure canning.

Water bath canning, boiling jars of food in a boiling water bath, is a quick and easy way to safely can high-acidity foods such as tomatoes and fruits. Pressure canning is required for preserving low-acid foods such as carrots, green beans and most other vegetables. The pressure method takes a little longer but offers gardeners a way to can almost anything from their gardens. Another process, pickling, involves preserving foods with either vinegar or salt.

Are All Hoses Created Equal?

Most garden hoses are made from vinyl, rubber or a combination of both-and they come in gradations of quality. The best hoses, like automobile tires, are layered with fiberglass or nylon to inhibit kinking and provide higher burst strength.

Size

All-purpose garden hoses are generally either 1/2" or 5/8" in diameter. A good 5/8" hose will have multiple layers of reinforced fabric (e.g., nylon) as well as layers of vinyl or rubber. We generally recommend the 5/8" hose, as the 1/2" will kink more easily and can burst if water is turned off at the nozzle instead of at the spigot. (However, a 1/2" hose does take up less space—we carry a 1/2" x 50' hose for use in your boat or camper.) We can also special order 3/4" diameter hoses if for some reason you need the extra capacity.

The most popular length for garden hoses is 50 feet. However, we find 25-foot hoses are quite popular in San Francisco because of the City's small yards. We carry garden hoses in a full range of lengths (4 feet to 100 feet).

Three Ways to Make **Hose Storage More Convenient**

Couplings: Hose couplings and swivels are generally made of brass or heavy-duty plasticthe thicker the better.

Swivels: Look for a hose with hexagonal rather than round swivels. Hexagonal swivels are much easier to hand-tighten, especially with wet hands.

Collars: Many hoses also come with a protective collar extending about 3 to 4 inches from the coupling. Hoses tend to kink at the first bend where the coupling is attached to the spigot—this collar prevents the hose from kinking at this vulnerable area.

Other Considerations

Before you purchase a hose, consider if you will want to drink water from it. Don't drink water from a hose that is not specified for that purpose. Hoses labeled "drinking water safe" are usually lined with a layer of medicalgrade plastic that keeps unhealthy materials from leaching into the water.

The manufacturer's warranty can give you an indication of quality. Manufacturers only offer a lifetime guarantee on the bestquality hoses-they know the best-quality hoses should truly last a lifetime, whereas lessexpensive hoses will eventually kink, burst or break down from ultraviolet light.

Tips to Make Your Garden Hose Last Longer

- Protect your garden hose from sunlight. While some hoses are designed to withstand ultraviolet rays better than others, eventually any hose will break down from constant exposure to sunlight. Keep the hose in a shaded area. (If you live where temperatures dip below freezing, be sure to drain the hose after use and protect it from freezing if possible.)
- Do not leave the hose under pressure—shut the water off at the spigot when you're done using it.
- Don't run hot water through the hose unless it is specified to carry hot water.
- Protect the hose from accidental cuts or punctures—make safe storage easy for yourself. Mount a hose hanger or hose reel in a shaded place next to the spigot, or purchase a mobile hose reel caddy or cart. If you don't find what you need in our nursery, we will gladly special order any hanger, reel or caddy to suit your needs.




