In the Garden with Rick



April Garden Tasks

Spring is the time to reap all the benefits of the hard work you put into your garden over the winter months! Are your spring bulbs blooming this month? While we might be lucky and have some April showers, this can also be the onset of our dry season and time to plan for smart irrigation during the dry months. The longer daylight also means you can enjoy your garden in the evening, after a long day at work.

✔ Weed and condition: It's easiest to weed when soil is damp, after a rainfall, for instance. After weeds are cleared, condition your soil using organic chicken manure. (Sku 7060197, \$4.29)



If you have sandy soil, try adding peat moss. (Sku 70584, \$7.99)

✔ Dig in, divide and conquer: Now is the time to replant both summer-blooming and fall-blooming perennials, especially if the past year's bloom was less than spectacular. Use a spade to make a clean cut to replant the younger outer portions of the bulbs.



✔ Easter lilies: Keep these beauties blooming for a longer period by keeping them in a cool, sunlit room, pinching off the anthers after the flower opens. After blooms have faded, plant lilies in a sunny garden spot, in a well-watered area with good drainage, to enjoy them for years to come.



✔ Transplant: If the soil is not too wet from recent rainstorms, you can begin transplanting.

✔ Get green: Seeding may be started outdoors now. Each month, plant something new for successive harvests during the upcoming months.



✔ Prune: Spring-blooming shrubs should be pruned right after their blooms have faded.



✔ Plant: Summer-flowering bulbs and annuals should be planted now, including dahlias,

gladiolas, lilies and callas. Bulb fertilizer, peat moss and manure can be mixed into the potting soil. Perennials can be planted and fed this month, too.

Hardy vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, carrots, lettuce and spinach can be planted outdoors now. Don't forget about herbs: thyme, rosemary, sage and mint are hardy enough to be planted now.

✔ Fine fruit: Fruit trees should be thinned out to about 5 inches per fruit bloom to encourage larger fruit. If you skipped fertilizing last month, fertilize now. April is also a good month to plant fruit trees. Protect established trees against ants and other crawling insects with all-natural Tree Tanglefoot. (Sku 70406, \$6.99)



✔ Rid your garden of pests: Slugs and snails can still be problematic, so deal with them now. Earwigs can be trapped in cardboard tubes or old



hoses placed around the garden.

✔ Get down and dirty: Does your soil need amendments? If so, add before any cover crops that you planted go to seed. Mulch can be added where necessary. Add mulch around shrubs and trees.

✔ In the house: To promote even growth and balance, indoor houseplants should be rotated so that each side receives sunlight.

✔ Arbor Day: Don't forget that Arbor Day is April 29! Plant a tree. Although it is eclipsed by its more glamorous cousin, Earth Day, Arbor Day has been around since 1872.

Tillandsia: Air Plants

Found in the forests, mountains and deserts of Central and South America and Mexico, these novel plants need no soil to grow! Members of the bromeliad family that includes Spanish moss, water and nutrients are absorbed through the leaves of the tillandsia, also known as air plants.

Caring for tillandsias is simple and makes for a fun project for children and families. Light should be bright but filtered and not direct in the summer months. They do love direct light in the cooler months



of November to March. Thoroughly wet your air plants two to three times a week. A garden hose works well, and tillandsias can also be submersed in a bucket of water. Feed your air plants a tablespoon of vitamin B1 per gallon of water.

Tillandsias can even be glued to hard surfaces or driftwood to create a stunning, living centerpiece for your dining room table. Assorted varieties. (\$3.99-\$26.99)



Kitchen Remodel Considerations

Arguably the most lived-in room of a house, the kitchen is often the focal point of many homes. With the high cost of real estate in the Bay Area, even in a downturned housing market, many homeowners are choosing to invest in remodeling their existing houses versus upgrading to new homes. If you are thinking of a complete kitchen overhaul or just a cosmetic facelift, here are some of the many design options to take into consideration.

Style

Your kitchen style should reflect your actual lifestyle—that is, the lifestyle that you actually have, not the one you wish you had. Also consider the architecture of your house so that your kitchen maintains continuity with the surrounding rooms and the rest of your home.

Not sure of your style? Flip through the many home magazines and books available and start a file. Eventually, your style will emerge as you collect pictures of kitchens that attract your eye.

Budget

Set a realistic budget that you can live with and identify areas where you have various cost options in order to make your budget work. Consider labor costs, as well as the costs of materials involved.

Appliances

If you are upgrading your appliances, this can be a major cost. Assess your cooking lifestyle. Do you cook healthy? Do you entertain frequently? Is your home where the extended family gathers for Thanksgiving and holidays? Do you enjoy baking?

When shopping for new appliances, look for energy-efficient models made of quality materials, with reliability and service protections.

The Work Triangle

When designing the layout of your kitchen,

imagine a triangle that connects your refrigerator, range and sink—or the work triangle. The sum of these lines should be between 23 and 26 feet total. These are the most traveled distances in a kitchen, and a single leg should be between 4 and 9 feet at most.

Cabinets and Storage

If your existing cabinet and storage space is sufficient, you may consider refinishing the faces instead of replacing them altogether as a cost-saving area. A small kitchen less than 150 square feet should have about 1,400 inches of shelf drawer frontage, while a large kitchen greater than 350 square feet should have approximately 2,000 inches.

Standard modular or premanufactured cabinets run in 3-inch increments, starting at 9 inches up through 36 inches. There are generally four basic types of cabinets, with many variations among them:

- Standard base cabinets have one drawer with a door and shelves below.
- Drawer-based cabinets have three or four stacked drawers
- Sink-based cabinets are open at the bottom with a door below a single false drawer front.
- Corner-based cabinets will fit in a corner and may have a lazy Susan inside for convenience.

Lighting

Long gone are the days when kitchens were designed with one searing overhead light fixture. Your lighting should complement your kitchen, as well as function. There are four different types of lighting to include in your new kitchen design:

- Task lighting focuses on the areas where you



will perform work—chop vegetables, wash the dishes, and so on.

- Accent lighting adds dimension and accentuates specific areas and the kitchen as a whole.

- Ambient lighting can create a soft, warm glow.

- Decorative lighting can add style and flair.

Tile and Countertops

Countertops range in materials that include marble, granite, limestone, soapstone and engineered stone or quartz—each with its own assets and drawbacks to consider. For example, engineered stone or quartz is well suited for families that include small children because there is no need to worry about sealing and maintenance, and they are generally scratch resistant. Limestone is calcium-based rock and will absorb food stains such as mustard or tomatoes. Granite will require sealing at the time of installation and about every six months.

Well chosen tile can add continuity and style to your kitchen, and there are many shapes, designs and colors to choose from. Tile options range from ceramic, glass, natural stone and even metal since stainless appliances have gained in popularity. If you like to paint your kitchen frequently to change the look, you might consider a neutral tile that will allow you many options.


Besides choosing a pattern or style of tile that works for you, choosing a skilled tile setter is equally important. Our Repair Referral Service recommends Bill, who learned the trade from his grandfather, whose work can still be seen around the City today.

Flooring

As we highlighted in the February *Hardware Hotline*, homeowners have many flooring options to choose from these days, including hardwood, prefinished wood, laminate and vinyl. If you have existing hardwood, refinishing is an option instead of replacing the entire floor.

Color

Choose a paint color that fits your lifestyle and one that you can live with. Test out different colors with paint samples before you commit to one.

Greener Options



Tile can be found made of recycled material. And, of course, choose a zero-VOC paint such as Benjamin Moore's Natura™ line.

Meet David, Our Landscape Gardener

NEW EPA LEAD LAWS

The Lead Law That Changes the Way We Renovate

San Francisco has always been at the forefront of protecting the environment and our residents. In the late '90s, our building code began requiring lead-safe work practices for any interior or exterior renovation work that affects painted surfaces. Owners must assume that paint layers older than 1979 contain lead, unless tested otherwise, send notifications to affected parties, enclose the work area to minimize the spread of lead-contaminated paint dust, and clean the work area to pass a visual inspection. Thus, handymen and women, contractors, and renovators working in San Francisco have already learned to work in a lead-safe manner.



Beginning this year, not only will those same individuals need to work lead-safe, but they will also need to comply with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) new Lead-Based Paint Renovation, Repair, and Painting Rule, which will require them to become EPA-Certified

Renovators. Even rental property owners may need to be certified. Before concluding a job, Certified Renovators will need to do a cleaning verification, using visual inspection as well as performing wipes of windowsills and floors in the work area for comparison with EPA's cleaning verification card.

Who Needs to Be Certified

- Professionals who perform activities that disturb painted surfaces in a pre-1978 home or facility with children or pregnant women will need to become Certified Renovators.
- The firms for which they work will need to become Certified Firms.
- Landlords and employees of a property management company who perform renovation work will need to be certified.
- Individuals who disturb paint who have been trained by a Certified Renovator and are under the supervision of a Certified Firm will *not* need to be certified.
- Individuals who paint without doing surface preparation will *not* need to be certified.

We're happy to announce that Larry Karp in our Repair Referral Service has completed the EPA-approved course. In addition, all of the general contractors that we refer have also successfully completed the course.



How to Become Certified

- The renovator must take an EPA-approved class and pass an examination at the end of the class.
- A firm must complete an EPA application with a fee of \$300 to become a Certified Firm.

Consequences of Noncompliance

- The penalty will be \$37,500 per violation.

Eco Easter Eggs

The tradition of dyeing Easter Eggs dates back to medieval times and is still popular today. Back then, though, they probably didn't have the nifty little color dyeing kits to color eggs, or even food coloring, for that matter. Natural ingredients were used then, and your kitchen is full of chemical-free food products that you can use to create fun colored eggs festive enough for any Easter basket.

Eggs can be dyed using a cold dip method, where the dye is produced by boiling ingredients with water, straining, and then soaking the egg. But for richer hues, hot dipping is the preferred method. This involves boiling the eggs directly with the colorant.

Shades will vary depending on how long you allow your eggs to soak in the color and how



much colorant you use. Be patient, as dyeing eggs naturally might take a little longer than the kits, and darker shades can be achieved by letting eggs soak overnight. Go ahead and experiment. You can always have egg salad sandwiches if your eggs don't look like something Martha Stewart might have created.

Egg Color Colorant Ingredient

Blue	Grape juice, canned blueberries
Orange	Onion skins, chili powder
Pink	Beets, cranberry juice, red cabbage
Violet	Hibiscus tea, red wine
Red	Pomegranate juice, canned cherries with syrup, red onion skins
Gold	Dill seeds
Brown	Coffee
Green	Spinach leaves


Shades of Green—The New Beige

In addition to "green" influencing color choices, it has also spawned the trend toward products made from natural



Who provided this miracle to the Sherman family? Regular community members, possibly your neighbor, your bank teller or your plumber, just neighbors helping neighbors. These community superheroes are volunteers who care about the people and the community facilities in their own neighborhoods. These are people who want to help ensure that an 89-year-old widow can continue to tend her garden, while aging safely at home.

For over 20 years now, hundreds of volunteers have contributed time, labor and donations to the Rebuilding Day effort each April, providing free repairs and renovations to low-income San Franciscans' homes, and to schools, community centers and nonprofits all over the City.

Rebuilding Together San Francisco (RTSF) is a local nonprofit that has worked in over 1,000 homes and 250 community facilities since their founding in 1989, a grassroots barn-raising effort following the Loma Prieta earthquake.

Each year they need the support of nearly 2,000 volunteers in order to achieve their lofty goals, which this year includes helping repair the homes of 25 low-income seniors or adults with disabilities and more than 20 nonprofits and schools.

Throughout the month of April and culminating on National Rebuilding Day, Saturday, April 30, RTSF will be building a new community garden in the Oceanview/Merced Heights/Ingleside (OMI) neighborhood, giving heat to a retired social worker, fixing the stairs for an 87-year-old widow, and installing both murals and trees on a high-density elementary school playground.

These projects are a joyous, hands-on way to give directly back to your community, with a tangible impact by the end of a single day's work. The dire need for repairs exists within our community well before and long after April. So in addition to Rebuilding Day, the year-round programs Home Safety, Energy Efficiency, and Light Repairs will serve over 240 low-income residents annually by providing safety upgrades,



weatherization, light seismic work and more, all provided free of charge by volunteers.

Rebuilding Together San Francisco is *always looking to grow and help more struggling seniors, low-income families, and disabled adults*—please join them in helping to keep your neighbors safe and warm in their homes.
